### **Q2 Highlights**

- We began work on the cassava demonstration plot project in Ubulu Uku, Delta State, which is aimed at improving farmers' productivity for increased local contribution to the industrial starch market.
- BSPs are beginning to adopt the business linkages model and utilize the skills from SME diagnostics training to improve their services
- The Business linkages Project recorded milestones in its work to improve the support market for small businesses and the capacity of SMEs with whom we work
- We worked with local partners to secure funding for the deployment of 1,200

- Biosand Filters to Dodo River community in Bayelsa State.
- Our Market Development and Appropriate Technology Enabled Development (ATED) teams worked with Ondo and Imo State chapters of the Partners for Peace (P4P) Network to promote the mechanical adjustable harvester to more farmers.
- We worked with sister organization Niger Delta Development Initiative (NDPI) to host an invitation-only Niger Delta Development Forum (NDDF) in London, UK.
- NDLink achieved several milestones, including surpassing 1,000,000 page views in just two years

### **Cassava Value Chain Project**

PIND and partners successfully established the demonstration plot at Ubulu Uku in Delta State. The demonstration plot is a pilot project where PIND is improving 200 cassava farmers' knowledge on best practices for improved agronomic outcomes and profitability. The demonstrations of best practices this guarter was led by Local Service Providers and included: land preparation, planting, weed management, fertilizer application. Farmers now show trust in these local service providers and are now interacting with these companies directly. That way, this project is a win-win: a bigger market for local service providers, and improved productivity for local farmers. PIND will continue to monitor the demonstrations, and will begin seeking areas where this project can be expanded to reach even more farmers.

Private companies partnering with PIND on the demonstration plot are covering the cost of ALL the inputs for the pilot project







PIND linked the Delta State-based Life Flour Mill with cassava processor Gonchuks. Now Gonchuks has a purchase order from LFM to deliver 30 tons of high quality cassava flour on a monthly basis.

### **Aquaculture Value Chain Project**

PIND continues to promote the demonstration pond intervention, which aims to improve fish farmers' practices for efficiency in production and profitability. As part of efforts to expand the demonstration pond to as many farmers as possible in the region, PIND signed a partnership agreement with Top Feeds, producer of Grand Cereals fish feed, and MARKETS II for the establishment of six demonstration ponds in Asaba and Ugboroke,

both in Delta State, on 29 April. Work will begin on these demonstration ponds on July 7th.

Following the success of the first round of demonstration ponds in Camp 74 in Asaba, Delta State, new fish farmers participating in the Top Feeds sponsored demonstration have expressed willingness to pay 5,000 naira to participate in the training. 20 farmers are directly benefitting from the demonstration ponds.



The Maximizing Agricultural Revenue and Key Enterprises in Targeted Sites (Markets) II project, a partnership between PIND and USAID achieved key milestones in various agricultural sectors.

### IN AQUACULTURE.

#### MARKETS II



Signed an MOU with Premier Feed Mill in April to continue best fish management practices using Demo ponds in Delta state. The MOU agrees to scale up to include additional fish farmer associations in Delta state to increase their productivity and income.



Engaged consultants to Train and 1,000 fish farmers in Cross River, Edo and Delta states using the MARKETS II Package of Practices (PoPs).



Engaged a Fish hatchery consultant to assess the status of hatchery facilities in Six Niger Delta states (Edo, Delta, Ondo, Bayelsa, Rivers and Cross River) in order to achieve regular and sustainable fingerling production.


Organized group dynamics and leadership skills training for 45 representatives from the 20 cassava farmers groups in Edo state.

### **Appropriate Technology Enabled Development (ATED) Project**

### Boosting Access to Clean Water

Further to previous quarter's efforts to promote the biosand filter in low-income communities in the Niger Delta to improve access to potable water, PIND worked with local partners to secure funding for the deployment of 1,200 filters to Dodo River community in Bayelsa State. After months of facilitation, Oxbow Lake Rotary Club in Yenagoa, Rotary District 9140, Nigeria, Parkdale-High Park Rotary Club in Toronto, Canada, and Rotary District 7070 all signed up to fund the Dodo RDC communities biosand filter project. These 1,200 filters will target the entire community population of 7,200 people.

#### Promoting Peaceable Economic Growth

Members of Ondo P4P led a campaign to introduce ATED technologies into local palm oil farming communities. This local campaign was supported by PIND and PIND's ATED program officers traversed Ondo's rural communities with the state chapter. Ondo State P4P has taken the lead in starting a P4P Farming Cooperative, a new sub-chapter of the state's

P4P dedicated to bringing farmers together to promote peaceable economic development. The new technologies were very well received; 3 agro-technology dealers in Ondo State are making arrangements to buy the harvesting

machine from PIND partner Texmaco to ensure supply of the machines in the state.

The Imo State's chapter did similar, working with Market Development and ATED teams to drive demonstrations of the mechanical adjustable harvester to farmers that had never worked with PIND. Additionally, the Chapter has set up a committee to create P4P Farming Cooperatives, complete with a formal Terms of Reference detailing how the Cooperative will function, disputes will be managed, and its organizational structure.

In coming quarters, PIND will support implementing partner Self-Help and Rural Development Association (SHERDA) to drive the promotion of these technologies through the P4P networks in these areas, and assist in the identification of other oil palm locations and agro-dealers.




## Leadership Empowerment Advocacy and Development (LEAD) Project

The LEAD project is a partnership between PIND and USAID, held a town hall meeting on peace and security in Khana LGA in Rivers state to avoid conflicts in the wake of the violence that characterized the elections in the state.

104 Participants (71 males and 33 females) attended the meeting and they included stakeholders from the Police, National Security and Civil Defense Corps, Local Vigilante groups and community representatives.






### Documenting Development in the Niger Delta

NDLink continued its work to document and verify development projects in the Niger Delta. Over 500 projects have been verified and published on NDLink using the Akvo Really Simple Reporting (RSR) tool and template. The team also began preparation for the AKVO RSR training in Q3, spurred on by the large number of projects on the platform and the need to train Implementing Partners quickly on how to use the tool.

#### Shrinking the Gender Gap

The gap between males and females on the platform is slowly shrinking. Instead of the ratio of 4:1, it is now 2:1 rate, which is a drastic improvement from last year during this same time period. Many of the advocacy campaigns in Q1 lead to the increase of more female registration and participation on the site.

### Partners for Peace (P4P) Project

### Expanding the Network's Reach

The PIND-supported Partners for Peace (P4P) project continues to expand its membership throughout the region. The Ondo state chapter created two sub-chapters this quarter, specifically targeting rural local communities with the highest levels of unemployment and restiveness. The state chapter also matched its peace building support to the state's communities with increased access to economic opportunities through farming, as reported in the Economic Development section in this report. In the coming quarter, PIND's P4P team will support the Partners for Peace Central Working Committee which is composed of leadership of each state chapter on leadership, strategic planning, and financial reporting, among other core competencies. This training will enhance their organizational leadership skills, and ensure the smooth running and independence of the P4P Network.

# Peaceable Livelihood and Community Engagement (PLACE) Project

Providing Support to Small Businesses

PIND provided support for micro-credit associations in Egbokodo and Ubeji communities under the PLACE project. As at June 2015, the Sisan lyatsere cooperative had given out its 3<sup>rd</sup> batch of loans and recorded a profit of N228,000 from an initial funding of N600,000. While the Egbokodo micro-credit scheme recorded a profit of N295,000 from its initial funding of N1,500,000.

The quarter saw improved management of loans and the cooperative business from both beneficiaries of PIND's micro credit support, with zero default recorded so far.
