

Sharing Fish Farming Best Practices on the Airwaves

Fish feed company and partner in PIND's demonstration pond project Grand Cereals commenced its PIND-supported fish farming academy on Crown FM radio station based in Asaba, Delta State, with a media outreach of 1,500,000 listeners. This important milestone follows the company's work with PIND and United States Agency for International Development (USAID)'s MARKETS II to expand the demonstration pond pilot project to improve fish farmers' practices and profits in Asaba and Ughelli, Delta State, in the third quarter of 2014. Fish feed companies like Grand Cereals, Ranaan Feeds, Top feeds and Aller Aqua feeds have come to understand that improving their relationship with fish farmers also helps to boost their sales. Their investment in our demonstration pond project, then, is really an investment in their own businesses. Grand Cereals is also furthering its collaboration with PIND and Federal College of Animal Health and Production Technology (FCAH&PT) in Vom, Plateau State, for the commencement of the practical academy that will train at least 100 fish farmers in its first year. A technical planning session for all partners is scheduled for 7th April in Jos, Plateau State. PIND is also working with another fish feed company Aller Aqua on another demonstration pond project which commenced in Akure, Ondo state this quarter.



Israel Yusuf, a.k.a Dr. Fish, graduated with a degree in Animal Health graduate from Ahmadu Bello University in Zaria, Kaduna State. He set up a fish farm in Ughelli, Delta State, during his year of National Youth Service and has been a farmer ever since. He now hosts the Fish Farming Academy on Crown FM. Cassava

Partnering with Ondo State Government to Boost Youth Interest in Agriculture

On December 22nd, 2015, the Foundation for Partnership Initiatives in the Niger Delta (PIND) signed a partnership agreement with Ondo State Wealth Creation Agency (WECA) on a pilot project to develop the agricultural entrepreneurship skills of graduate youth through cassava production. The team leveraged 28 million naira in funding from Star Deepwater Petroleum Company Ltd, a subsidiary of NNPC-Chevron Nigeria Limited joint venture, and this project will benefit 40 graduate youths from 18 different local government areas in Ondo State at this pilot stage. The project also received 8 million naira from Ondo State WECA as part of their in-kind contribution to the project. In addition to addressing unemployment, this program will also go a long way to making agriculture an attractive option for young people. PIND will facilitate implementation and market linkages, while WECA will provide technical support. Ondo State Government will provide the land to be used and extension services. The team carried out a one-week induction workshop for the graduate youth pro-farmers in March 2016. The project will begin in earnest on April 4th.

Improving Cassava Farmers' Practices

The farmers are yet to harvest their cassava from the demonstration plot pilot project set up to improve their practices and profitability, but there is already evidence of changes in knowledge, attitude and agronomic practices of trained farmers. Following the completion of the demonstration plot pilot in Ubulu Uku, Delta State, partner input companies Harvest Field and Notore conducted a training for 96 farmers (61 female and 35 male) on agronomic practices and herbicide application to a different set of farmers, this time at Umukabia Ogodo in Ngor Okpala LGA. Following this training, the 56-members strong Mezie Umukabia Farmers Multi-Purpose Cooperative Society bought a herbicide spraying equipment from the input company. This spraying equipment will be used as a means of generating income to the association by offering spraying services to other members of the association for a fee. This way, the association improves its weed management while generate income for its members.

Improving Financial Access for Mechanized Agriculture

Improving access to mechanized agriculture and improving access to finance for farmers has to go hand in hand, as many farmers may not be able to readily afford improved technology. That is why PIND, in partnership with USAID MARKETS II, worked during the guarter to support the microfinance institution Lift Above Poverty Organization (LAPO) to develop a loan product to enable farmer groups more easily purchase the mechanical adjustable harvester, a harvesting technology that allows farmers to harvest palm fruit with minimal labor and no climbing. PIND signed a partnership with the microfinance institution, regional distributor of the harvester Texmaco, and four farmer groups in Cross River State, each 15 members strong. Under this agreement, LAPO has so far disbursed N330,000 for the procurement of 2 MAH to two of the farmer groups. These two machines have been used in 23 farms and generated income of NGN51,100 in one month.

Promoting New Innovations for Improved Harvesting


This quarter also saw the introduction of the Malaysian knife, harvesting knife used on trees nine meters and above. This is important, because ~60% of smallholder plantations are above seven meters tall. PIND has entered into a partnership with Willstin Ventures, a lead distributor of the Malaysian knife, to promote adoption in the Niger Delta. As it is cheaper than the Mechanical Adjustable Harvester, has seen enthusiastic acceptance. Additionally, the distributor for the mechanical adjustable harvester Texmaco has shown interest in also selling the Malaysian Knife. He has made an order of the knives to sell, and will soon begin conducting demonstrations. In the first quarter of its promotion, 20 Malaysian Knives were sold.

Influencing Building Practice in the Niger Delta





We built the Appropriate Technology Enabled Development (ATED) Center at our Economic Development Center premises in Warri, Delta State, to increase awareness on environmentally-conscious building, and this plan is working. Following Prof. Center Director for for Research and Development for Federal University of Technology Akure (FUTA), Ondo State, Prof. Ayorinde Olufayo's visit to the Center,

the Department of Urban & Regional Planning, University of Benin, Edo State extended content of its Local Geography Studies from Edo State to Mosogar in Delta State, intended to include studying of ATED Building as an example of climate related building using the Mosogar lateritic soil. Promoting Civic Engagement at Social Media Week in Lagos

The Strengthening Advocacy for Civic Empowerment (SACE) program co-funded by both PIND and United States Agency for International Development (USAID) hosted a half-day event on civic empowerment and youth at Social Media Week in Lagos. Social media has played an outsized role in fostering discussion on governance in Nigeria in the past five years, especially because of its appeal to young people. This event takes advantage of that appeal and engages youth online in a non-partisan way on their right to information and participation as citizens. Co-hosted by the advocacy-focused coalition Enough Is Enough, this event had such panelists as: Kaduna State Governor Gov. Nasir El Rufai, Bayelsa State Senator Ben Bruce, and Stanley Achonu of the accountability watchdog BudglT. This is the second year in a row in which SACE has held this conversation and, just as in the previous year, PIND's Advocacy for Niger Delta Development (ANDD) team supported the event by helping drive the online conversation, engaging Niger Delta youth on issues concerning governance and advocacy. Strengthening Organizational Capacity Through CAPABLE

PIND through its Capacity Building for Local Empowerment (CAPABLE) program has been working since 2012 to strengthen civil society in the Niger Delta's ability to be true advocates for Nigerians in the region. PIND recently introduced the Challenge Fund through the CAPABLE program to provide seed grants to organizations as part of post-training support for organizations that participated in the Capacity Building for Local Empowerment (CAPABLE) trainings. The Foundation made presentations of the in-kind grants in form of equipment to promote their productivity and efficiency following a brief ceremony presided over by PIND Programs Director in February 2015. The organizations who received the grants were: Centre for Development Support Initiative (CEDSI); Accord for Development (ACCORD); Centre for Information and Development (CFID); Forward Africa (FOFA); and Better Living Foundation (BLF). As ever, the support for CAPABLE grantees does not end there; PIND has also provided an online community of practice for organizations who have experienced CAPABLE trainings to facilitate knowledge sharing, and provide follow up support.

Margaret Adedeji, Executive Director Better Living Foundation, Akure, Ondo State, participated in the CAPABLE intermediate training from October 2014 to April 2015. "I participated fully in all the three trainings comprising Intermediate Course of CAPABLE, and it has greatly enhanced my skills in the areas covered. My organization now prepares very professional proposals. We have also improved on our financial management system and reporting. It was actually the skills we learned in the proposal writing class that enabled us get this CAPABLE Challenge Fund grant. We were even able

to secure sponsorship to attend the Africa Regional Meeting on New Urban Agenda for Africa in February 2016, which concerns the Sustainable Development Goals and addresses under-development in the Niger Delta. "I reached out to an on-line media to write a story on the meeting focusing on the plight of the underprivileged in the Niger Delta region. I used skills from the Proposal Writing and ICT classes, particularly Newsletter development class, to develop a Story on Urbanization in the Niger Delta. The story earned me 500 dollars!"

Improving Grassroots Governance in Rivers State with LEAD

The Leadership, Empowerment, and Development (LEAD) program is funded by PIND and United States Agency for International Development (USAID), implemented by Research Triangle International (RTI). The program works to improve local governance in Obio-Akpor, Bonny, Akuku Toru, Khana, Tai, and Okrika Local Government Areas (LGAs).



Pledging Parity on **International Women's**Day

PIND organized a well-attended forum to celebrate International Women's Day on March 8. With the international theme 'Pledge for Parity: Support Women in Agriculture' the Forum was held partnership with USAID/PIND MARKETS II Project and Working Fingers Initiative International, a coalition of women-focused organizations in Delta State, promoting women's empowerment and gender equality. The 102 (89 women, 13 men) participants comprising women farmers, financial institutions officials, Niger Delta States government representatives, development partners, the media, civil society organizations and other agricultural value chain players came from different States of the Niger Delta. Two interactive panels where women farmers learnt how to access funding for their businesses and shared information effectively on within organizing their communities for their interests. of advocates themselves. That is why PIND's Media Hub did a four-day training for Participatory Partnerships For Community Development (PPCD) on media for development, including online storytelling and photography, after having been approached by the organization in December 2015. This training was

conducted for 16 participants from five civil society organizations, and echoed the growing trend and need of organizations to more effectively tell their own stories to donors and other targeted audiences.

In the pre-training evaluation, only 28% of participants reported a basic understanding of core media products and their use. That figure increased to 70% following the training. Follow-ups with the participants and organizations from the training will be done in quarter 2 of 2016 to ensure learning is being mainstreamed into their organization's work.

Improving Stakeholder Coordination for Niger Delta Development

A major challenge for coordination of development efforts in the Niger Delta is the multiplicity of development documents, even at government level. To improve on this, we partnered with the Federal Ministries of Niger Delta Affairs and the Environment, the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC) and the Presidential Amnesty Program, alongside UK Department for International Development (DFID) program Facility for Oil Sector Transparency (FOSTER) to host a two-day technical workshop with the theme "From Stabilization to Sustainable Development" to come up with a cohesive and harmonized development plan for the region. It is hoped that through dialogue with government representatives and other stakeholders, which are expected to result in stakeholder buy-in, the Niger Delta Way Forward intervention has the potential of addressing lack of political will experienced by the previous administration, which prevented the implementation of the Niger Delta Action Plan. Boosting State-Level Collaborations for Socioeconomic Development

On February 11, 2016, PIND's leadership team met with the Chief Economic Advisor of Cross Rivers State, Dr. Francis Ntamu, to continue and hammer out areas of possible collaboration between the two entities. An initial meeting between PIND and the Governor of Cross River State was held in January 2016 where areas of possible collaboration that are in line with Cross River State Government and the strategic development focus of PIND were explored. In the February meeting, both parties identified key areas of collaboration between PIND and Cross River State Government, including: agriculture, strategic economic planning, youth development, conflict assessment and sectoral development. The team is also finalizing details for a partnership agreement with Delta State. These agreements will be signed in the second quarter of 2016.



355 conflict monitors were trained on conflict analysis and SMS Early Warning system. This has led to an increased amount of reports on the incident reports. Also,132 P4P members from all 9 states were trained on conflict analysis, Negotiation, Mediation and Advocacy strategies. They were then inaugurated as members of the Prevent Committee, a sub-set of P4P dedicated to the network's early warning system

Supporting Internal Governance of the Network





The Akwa Ibom chapter resolved what could have been a clash between two parties following the local council elections




The Cross River team resolved brewing ethnic tensions resulting from the presence of an organized Hausa community
