

Monthly Conflict Incident Tracker

Cross River - April/May 2016

Background

This monthly tracker is designed to update Peace Agents on patterns and trends in conflict risk and violence, as identified by the Integrated Peace and Development Unit (IPDU) early warning system, and to seek feedback and input for response to mitigate areas of conflict.

Patterns and Trends Feb 2016-Apr 2016

According to Peace Map data (see Figure 1), there was a rise in violence and fatalities in April 2016. Protests, inter-communal conflict and violent criminality were the main sources of violence during the period.

Inter-communal Conflict: In February, Inter-communal conflict was reported to be rising in Obubra and Yakurr. In April these issues escalated when about 11 people, mainly children, women and the aged, were reported killed over disputed farmlands in Yakurr. Several houses were also reported destroyed during a conflict in Obubra.

Political Tensions: In February, there were reported assassination attempts on two prominent political personalities by suspected gunmen in Calabar.

Cult Violence: In February, a young man was reportedly shot dead in a cult war, while another person was killed in a suspected reprisal attack in Obudu.

Protests: In March, there were reported protests in Akamkpa and Obubra LGAs over an alleged government plan to clear a forest to make way for the construction of a highway.

Others: In February a mob reportedly lynched a suspected murderer. In April a fatality was reported in a clash between policemen and members of the Nigerian Security and Civil Defense Corps (NSCDC) in Calabar Municipal.

Recent Incidents or Issues, May 2016

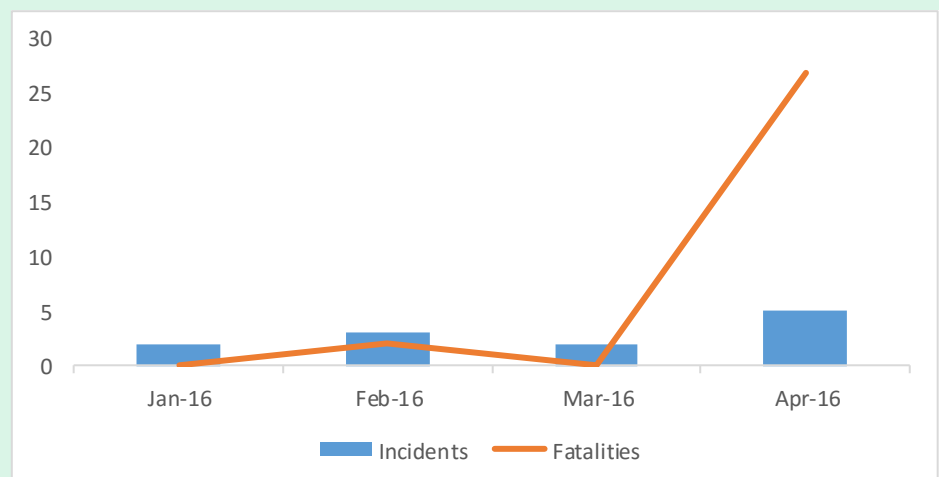
Incidents reported in May included boundary disputes, kidnapping, and robbery.

Boundary Dispute: Several people were reported killed in a boundary dispute between communities in Ikwo LGA of Ebonyi state and Abi LGA in Cross River state.

Intra-Communal Tensions: Intra-communal tensions and violence was reported following the assassination of a businessman who was a former LGA Councilor in Ugep, Yakurr LGA. Youths reacted by looting shops belonging to other businesspersons.

Kidnapping: Gunmen reportedly attacked

the University of Calabar and kidnapped three people including the wife and daughter of a lecturer.

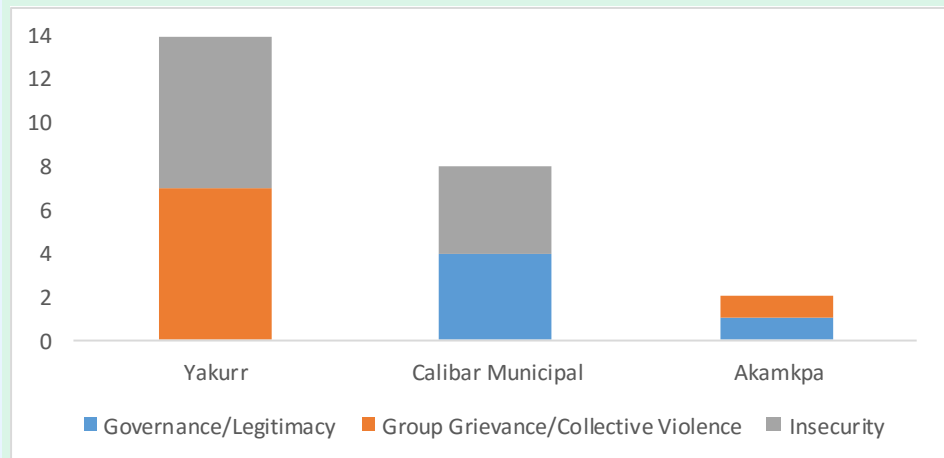
Prognosis

Questions for Peace Agents

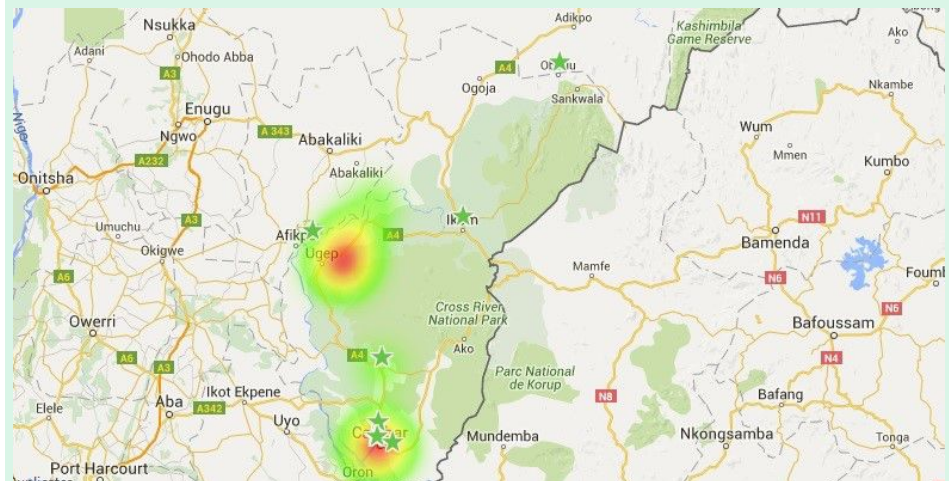
1. Is there anything significant missing from the tracker in terms of hotspots, trends, or incidents?

3. What are some likely trigger events in the next 6 months that could escalate this conflict?
4. Who are the key stakeholders that have influence on the conflict?
5. What will you do to help mitigate the conflict in the short, medium, and long term?
