

Conflict Incident Monthly Tracker

Imo State: July-August 2018

Background

This monthly tracker is designed to update Peace Agents on patterns and trends in conflict risk and violence, as identified by the Integrated Peace and Development Unit (IPDU) early warning system, and to seek feedback and input for response to mitigate areas of conflict.

Patterns and Trends May-July 2018

According to Peace Map data (see Figure 1), incidents reported in the state during this period included criminality, communal tensions, cult violence, political tensions, and protests.

Violent Criminality: In June, a 17-year old boy was reportedly beaten to death by his relatives during a disagreement in Oru LGA. The deceased was beaten to death by one of his brothers and some cultists in the area.

Cult Violence: In May, four students of the Imo State University (IMSU) were reportedly killed in a clash between members of Aiye and Bagger confraternities in Owerri Municipal LGA.

Communal Tensions: In June, a traditional ruler was reportedly assassinated in Orlu LGA. The killing was alleged to be related to political issues and a dispute over land in the community.

Political Tensions: In May, tension was reportedly heightened in some parts of the state following disagreements over the outcome of the ward congress of the All Progressives Congress (APC) in the state. Following the disputed outcome of the ward

congress, some youths burned down houses and injured some persons in Oguta LGA. Separately, there was chaos in the State House of Assembly following the alleged removal and replacement of the Majority Leader of the House in Owerri Municipal LGA. In July, political tension was further elevated in the state over the suspension of some members of the Imo State House of Assembly and the impeachment of the deputy governor of the state by 19 out of the 37 members of the state Assembly.

Protests: In June, scores of women protested at the Imo State government house in Owerri the state capital, over frequent attacks by herdsmen in the area. In July, there was a protest at the State House of Assembly complex in Owerri, the state capital, over political issues in the state. In a

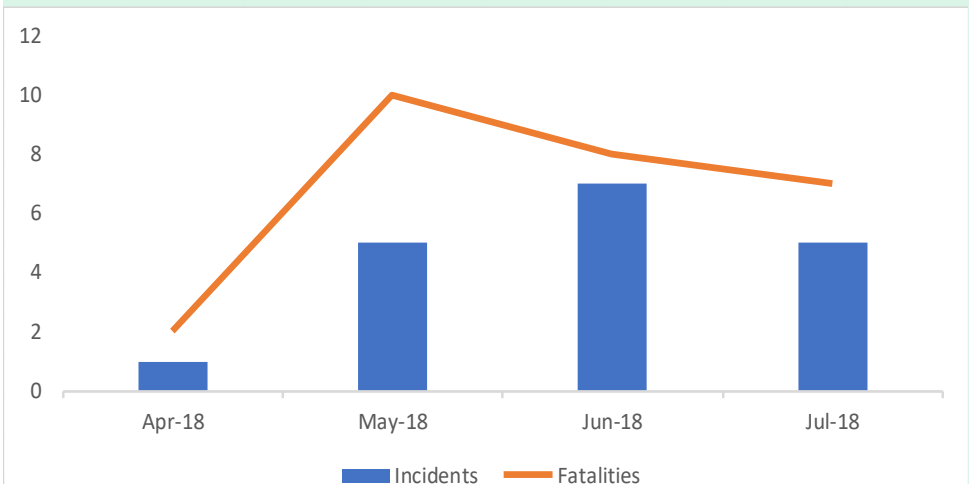
separate incident, some parishioners of a church in Oguta LGA reportedly protested over the alleged removal of a priest in the church. In a separate incident, there was a protest by women over the destruction of their farms by herders in Amakohia-Ubi community, Owerri Municipality.

Recent Incidents or Issues, August 2018

Incidents during the month related mainly to human trafficking and protests.

Child Trafficking: A 28-year old man and his 30-year old wife reportedly sold three babies for six hundred thousand naira in Umuokai Owerri-Nta community, Isiala Ngwa South LGA. The suspects lured a woman to a location and disposed her of her two children, a 3-year old girl and a 6-months old

baby boy, and sold them. The suspects also sold their 4-months old baby boy to raise money for the family.

Protests: There was a protest by some female supporters of the Indigenous People of Biafra (IPOB) in Owerri, the state capital, over the detention and disappearance of IPOB leader, Nnamdi Kalu. The women were later teargassed and arrested by the police for alleged unlawful assembly.

Others: The headless corpse of a young woman was reportedly dumped by the roadside in Mgbirichi community, Ohaji/Egbema LGA. The victim is believed to have been killed for ritualistic purposes as one of her breasts was cut off.

Prognosis

Incidents during the period related mainly to criminality, communal tensions, cult violence, political tension, child trafficking, and protests. Peace Agents must continue to monitor the situation closely and respond appropriately.

Questions for Peace Agents

1. Is there anything significant missing from the tracker in terms of hotspots, trends, or incidents?
2. Which conflict issue suggested by, or missing from, this tracker is a priority for you?
3. What are some likely trigger events in the next 6 months that could escalate this conflict?
4. Who are the key stakeholders that have influence on the conflict?
5. What will you do to help mitigate the conflict in the short, medium, and long term?

Figure 2: Conflict Fatalities by LGA (May - July 2018)

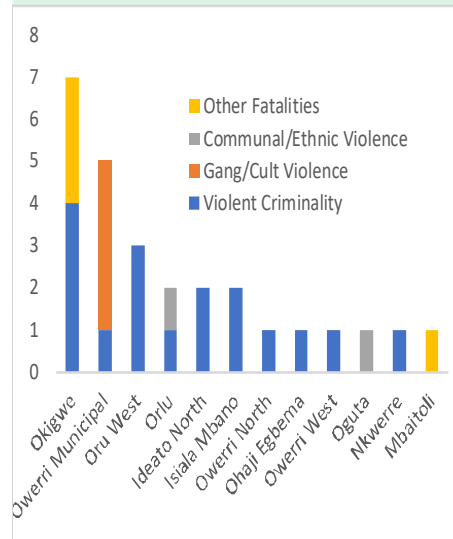
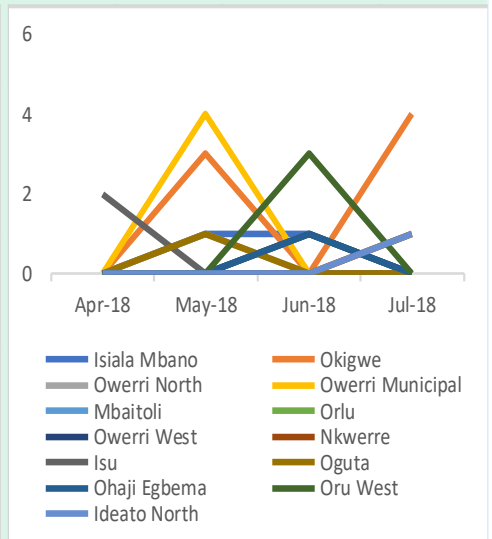
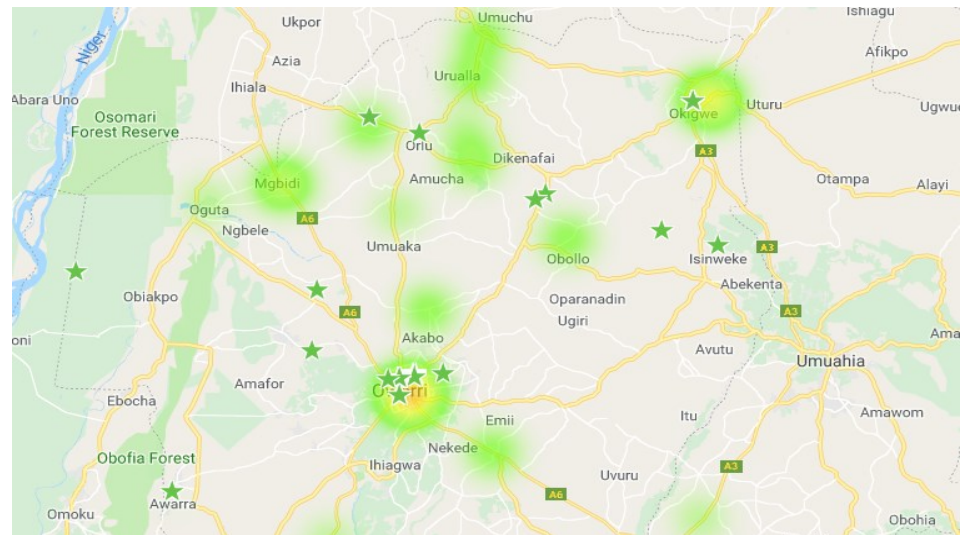


Figure 3: Conflict Fatalities by LGA
