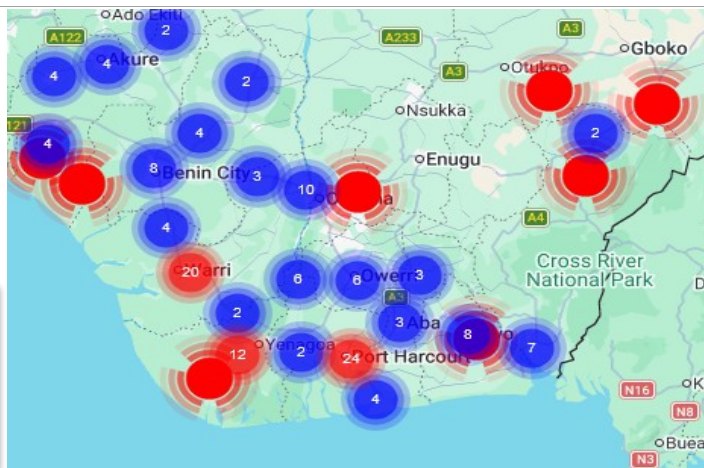
Strengthening Flood Preparedness and Community Resilience in the Niger Delta

July 12-18, 2026

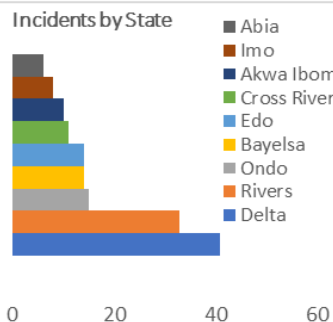
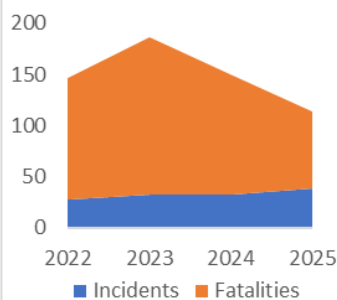
This update highlights flood risks in the Niger Delta and the need to strengthen preparedness and community resilience. Recent flooding incidents and [NiMet's](#) advisory identifying all the nine states in the region as flood-prone underscore the importance of early warning and coordinated action to protect lives, livelihoods, and property.

Anticipated Trends and Dynamics

Continued heavy rainfall and inadequate drainage are likely to increase flood risks across the region. Strengthened early warning, preparedness, and coordinated response will be critical to reducing the impacts on lives, livelihoods, property, and critical infrastructure.

Actions Taken to Mitigate the Situation

Stakeholders are strengthening early warning, preparedness, and coordinated response efforts across flood-prone states. However, sustained investment in drainage infrastructure, community awareness, and contingency planning is essential to reduce flood impacts.



Timeline of Recent Flooding Incidents in the Niger Delta

July 10, 2026

Heavy rainfall reportedly caused flooding and triggered a landslide, killing over five people in Calabar Municipal LGA, Cross River State.

July 10, 2026

Floodwaters reportedly claimed the life of a one-year-old child and damaged several properties in Calabar South LGA, Cross River State.

July 09, 2026

Severe flooding reportedly submerged houses and displaced thousands of residents following heavy rainfall in Uyo LGA, Akwa Ibom State.

July 07, 2026

A commercial motorcyclist reportedly died after being swept away by floodwaters in Agbor, Ika South LGA, Delta State.
